The American Association was one of the two premier leagues in the early days and participated in several precursors to the World Series. Tom discovered that in the Association back in the 1880s, when Don Young, George Mallett, and Clifford the Elder were mere lads, the league allowed injured players to take a runner from home. After all, people weren't going to spend good money (25 cents per game!) to watch second-stringers and scrubs.

One American Asociation player whose name a lot of us will recognize was Charles "Old Hoss" Radbourn, a pitcher. Oddly enough, the SSSSL once had a player who had similar nickname: "Ol' Hoss's Ass."
